Our volunteers are trained to focus on positive reinforcement, trust-building, and the achievement of goals by engaging youth in one-on-one outings and group adventures in the community. All of CPY-BBBS programs foster positive change in youths' lives through goal-setting, self-discipline, and skill development in the areas of athletic, outdoor, artistic, academic, and vocational pursuits.

Welcome to the first newsletter of our new organization, Committed Partners for Youth, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lane County. I am proud of the hard work and time invested by so many individuals to create this union over the past three years. Our sole objective? More mentoring relationships. With state and school budgets shrinking mentoring has become an even more essential element of the holistic safety net so critical to youth and families when they are struggling. Our two organizations had to turn away over 150 children in need last year. There was no ego or governance issue that could de-rail the process when we reminded ourselves of our end goal: to provide these 150 children and more with the most valuable, beautiful resource in Lane County... the ability to learn from the life lessons and experiences of

our community's men and women who volunteer as mentors. Inside this edition we will share with you our exciting changes — our new name, logo, office location, board of directors, leadership board, and staff members. Yes, it has been a very, very busy and rewarding year.

We are building on the historical legacy of Llew Albrecht, CPY's founder, and Tom Diamantine who ensured that the local Big Brothers Big Sisters remained strong under the guidance of the Eugene Family YMCA. Uniting our two local organizations is a model for the state and nation, as shown by the endorsement of support from Oregon Community Foundation, Meyer Memorial Trust, and U.S. Department of Justice. Just as corporations are doing across the country and world, CPY and BBBS have boldly

joined forces to maximize administrative efficiencies for the sake of the missions we serve, while maximizing the impact of the community's investments in mentoring.

We realize that the acceptance of change is not always easy, and so over the course of the next year, we are dedicated to reaching out to all of you to answer your questions and hopefully assuage any of your concerns. I know I speak for the entire staff when I say that we draw our strength and inspiration to surmount the day-to-day challenges from our CPY-BBBS youth, many of whom have endured more than their fair share of family disruptions and changes during their short lives. We find our courage from Paul, age 10. When little Paul comes bouncing into our office

excited to dance hip hop with his mentor after being pulled from his grandmother's home and placed in foster care – with grandmom having been the only stable adult in his life since his father was sentenced to prison and mother abandoned him in the streets....when he looks up to us with his bright eyes ready to try something new with his new mentor, all of us at CPY–BBBS take a deep breath, forget our fears, and dive right into our next challenge. *Please come join us!*

WE COULDN'T HAVE DONE THIS WITHOUT YOU!

It truly took a village of people and organizations to make the marriage of CPY and BBBS a reality. The three main parties determining the strategic direction for the merger were the staff members and board leadership of Committed Partners for Youth, our local Big Brothers Big Sisters program, and the Eugene Family YMCA, which had been the parent organization for BBBS during the past ten years. Although the initial conversation began over three years ago, a task force of board and staff members, led by facilitator Margot Helphand, analyzed the possibilities in earnest from spring through fall of 2008 with the central objective being to maximize the opportunity for more children in Lane County to benefit from caring mentoring relationships.

After formally joining forces, we began the journey to find ourselves a new home in the heart of downtown Eugene. We celebrated the grand opening of our new office at 935 Oak Street with a festive Open House celebration on September 15th. Over 200 people joined us for our ribbon cutting ceremony where community leaders Jean Tate and Jack Roberts recognized the importance of mentoring today's youth to ensure a healthy, prosperous future. An enormous "shout out" of thanks from the staff, board, mentors and youth at CPY-BBBS to the following people and organizations who have volunteered significant time, energy, expertise, in-kind and financial resources to ensure this merger's success.

CPY-BBBS was privileged to have been selected as one of five agencies to receive funding generated by the Great Rotary Duck Race for a second, consecutive year. Local Rotarians have been selling Ducks Race tickets for over 20 years and have raised millions of dollars to combat child abuse in our community. On October 10, more than 70,000 little rubber ducks bobbed and raced down the Willamette River next to Alton Baker Park. Many supporters of CPY-BBBS who bought tickets showed up at the river park to cheer on the little ducks in their big race.

On November 3, 2009, CPY-BBBS received a \$40,000 check from the Great Rotary Duck Race to help fund our TRUE Friends Program, which matches adult mentors with children and youth who have an incarcerated parent.



"THE BOLDER OPTIONS PROGRAM

The Bolder Options Program provides mentors for boys ages 12-18 who are on probation and in residential treatment through a Looking Glass Program called Stepping Stone. It is a seven month, athletic-focused mentoring program where the boys are matched with a volunteer adult mentor who works out with them once a week and helps them prepare to run in seven road races throughout the seven months. The boys set their sights on the ultimate road race, the 4th of July Butte to Butte 10k run.

One of the boys, 17 year-old Steve, bemoaned at the beginning, "I'm not a long distance runner and why do we have to run so far?" I'm a sprinter!" Well, in June, the boys ran in the Eugene Challenge Mile put on by the Eugene Running Company. Steve ran a 5:59.00 mile- his fastest mile ever! He continued to run and work out with his mentor gearing up for the Butte to Butte. When he crossed the finish line, after his first ever 10K race, he looked astonished! He ran a 7:43.00 mile pace for 6 miles! Watch out Galen Rupp!

Another great story - Jason, age 17. Despite feeling overweight, Jason was initially super excited about being on the team. However, once the boys began increasing the miles during workouts, he had second thoughts. "I don't want to run so far, can't I walk?" Can't I take a short cut and meet you guys back at the house?" Jason was quite content with running a few steps and walking a mile. His attitude changed, however, during our 5K (3.2 mile) CASA run in May. He was one of the very last finishers, but when he crossed the finish line, he smiled and screamed, "I feel great! I could run that again!" By July, Jason had lost 25 pounds and successfully completed the Butte-to-Butte race.

All of the boys in the program did amazingly well, spending over 120 hours at running practice, an additional 90 hours working out with their mentors, and running over 22 miles in road race events. Their accomplishments will last a lifetime.

Special thanks to our incredible team of mentors and volunteer coaches who worked one-on-one with the boys, empowering them to achieve their goals.



Always a colorful and fun event, this year topped them all with over 40 participants spanning the breadth of our new CPY-BBBS family on a brilliant, sunny day at Morse Ranch. Participants launched rousing games of badminton with the grandmas versus mentors and youth, while others organized a great baseball game going in the outer field. Later, everyone rallied in the shelter area to learn the different tie-dye methods before launching into their own creations. Soon, shirts, socks, and sheets were being twisted and banded in all kinds of contorted shapes. Adults gingerly applied dyes, contemplating color combinations and dye patterns, while the kids took a more willy-nilly approach with abundant colors and dye. Over the next few weeks we marveled at the unexpected beauty and designs created by everyone. The day rounded out with a fantastic BBQ and delicious treats provided by several grandmothers with children in the program. We all went home feeling vibrant, full, satisfied and colorful!









FOSTERING SUCCESS IN GIRLS, WITH LADIES LEADING THE WAY!





Throughout the past year, Committed Partners for Youth, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lane County has helped lead the charge for efficiency, innovation, and change throughout our community. Beyond the excitement of our agency integration, we have joined forces with six other local non-profits to create an innovative collaborative serving girls aging out of foster care. Funded through United Way's Women in Philanthropy group, the Helping Open Doors by Preparing and Empowering (HOPE) Young Women program launched in January 2009. The program serves ten girls in the Independent Living Program of Looking Glass Inc. over a 3-year period with an array of supportive services including: supportive case management, one-on-one mentoring, a structured work experience, education on healthy bodies and healthy relationships, financial literacy, and a matched savings account.

Drawing upon the existing programs and strengths of the Independent Living Program, Ophelia's Place, Planned Parenthood, NEDCO, Lane Workforce Partnership, Committed Partners for Youth, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Lane County, and the United Way, this pilot project has been able to fly!

In the first six months of the program, the girls experienced substantial life changes such as multiple moves, changes in work or school status, relationship upheavals, and pregnancy. All have relied on the strength of their mentoring relationships as a source of solace, problem-solving or as an opportunity to have fun and escape the duress present in their lives. The girls are all driven and have set inspirational goals, including higher education degrees and independent living. They were placed in summer

work positions through the Obama Administration's Stimulus Act, and five of them are enrolled in college this year, including one youth attending the pre-med program at Oregon State University. More than anything, this program has provided a rich network of support for the girls, beginning with their mentors. Just in the last month, the girls were recipients of new bikes, locks, and helmets through GEARS and Hutch's Bicycles, books through CPY-BBBS's First Book Grant, and laptop computers through the Dr. John Crumbley's Youth Support Fund.

Mentors have participated in the usual array of outings, but have also assisted the girls in their apartment searches, helped them select work clothes for new jobs through donated opportunities with Ruby Tuesday, helped with academic advising, and been a core thread in the fabric of their lives. We are excited to launch into the second year of weekly classes and activities and see where these pairs go!
